We also extend a strong mähsi, cho to our Alaska relatives for all their support throughout the years, and to our youth leaders, who will keep our traditions alive for generations yet to come.

The story of Moosehide Gathering

In the late 1800s, as tens of thousands of gold seekers arrived in the Klondike Valley, Chief Isaac of the Hän people recognized that his community's traditions and way of life were threatened. He took the songs and dances of its people across the border to the old Tanacross village at Lake Mansfield, Alaska, entrusting his relatives to preserve them until the time was right. At this time, the Hän people moved from Tr'ochëk, their fish camp at the mouth of the Klondike and Yukon rivers, to Moosehide Village where we celebrate the gathering today.

The Tanacross community and extended family members held Chief Isaac's songs for our people for many decades until we were ready to reclaim them. The 1991 Yukon Aboriginal Languages Conference provided inspiration for the renewal of Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in culture. Our main objective was to revitalize Hän history, songs, dances, and traditional dress. That same year, we held a weekend camp to bring our people together and enjoy each other's company.

In 1992, a group of Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in people travelled to Tanacross to observe and learn how to host a large traditional gathering. It was then that they began learning long-forgotten Hän songs and dances.

Committed to revitalizing our ancestors' celebrations, the Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in hosted the first Moosehide Gathering in 1993. Moosehide Gathering is a celebration of our culture and honoring of our heritage, our ancestors, and our future. We invite everyone to join us at Moosehide to share our stories, songs, and dances, enjoy local and guest performers, and the tasty feasts prepared by our cooks. We are honored to have you visit us.

Remember Moosehide Village is located several kilometers down river from Dawson City and you will not have quick access to stores and general supplies.



Water

Please bring your own supply of drinking water to the Moosehide Gathering. There will be potable water available, but it must be brought in by boat. Please help by bringing your own.



Extra Snacks

If you are a hungry wolf, be sure to bring extra food and snacks! A free nightly feast is offered, and food is available for sale all day at the concession, but be sure to bring extra just in case.



Camping Equipment

If you plan to stay at Moosehide Village for the duration of the Gathering, be sure to bring all the necessary equipment for camping.



Cash

Be sure to bring cash if you wish to purchase merchandise, raffle/draw/50-50 tickets, or concession items.





Transportation

Free boat rides to Moosehide Gathering will be provided.

Remain patient during high-traffic hours as there will be many people travelling to or from Moosehide Village. Please note that Elders and performers have priority on boats.

Our ancestors are in attendance at the graveyard, and it is very important that they be treated with respect. An offering of tobacco and prayer is appreciated. Mähsj cho.

- Offering them your chair or place at the table
- Asking them if they would like food, tea, or coffee
- Offering to help them if they seem in need
- Giving them your place in line at the boats, feast, or concession stand




Songs & Jamming

Performer Biographies

Master Of Ceremonies William Greenland

YELLOWKNIFE, NWT

William Greenland is due to return to the Moosehide Gathering this summer... If you aren't familiar with William, he is a proud citizen of Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in. He decided to carry on his mom's legacy of being Tr'ondëk. William currently resides

in Yellowknife and works as independent traditional wellness counselor, Native American Flute Recording Artist who plans to release a new full-length album in 2024. William was the Moosehide Gathering MC from 2006 to 2018 and has seen so much wonderful music that could be heard all along the wonderful Yukon River. He is excited to be back for the 16th Moosehide Gathering.



Hän Singers and Dancers DAWSON, YT

The Hän Singers and Dancers have been singing traditional Hän songs since the early 1990s. The group includes members of all ages and performs in small and large ensembles. The history of the songs sung by the Hän Singers extends back to Chief Isaac, an influential Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in leader. He foresaw that his people could lose an important part of their culture: the songs and dances. Elders tell stories of how Chief Isaac gave the Hän songs to Alaskan people for safekeeping. Elder

Archie Roberts was the only one who knew the songs when Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in had their first Moosehide Gathering in 1993. Since then, Alaskan Elders Laura Sanford, Larry Jonathan, and Kenny Thomas Sr. and their family members have assisted Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in in reviving five traditional songs from Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in Traditional Territory. Since Moosehide Gathering 2006, the group has received two new songs.

The Hän Singers recorded 10 songs at the Dawson City Music Festival Association's recording studio in 2024. You will be able to buy your copy during the Gathering.

Tanacross Drummers & Dancers

TANACROSS, ALASKA

The Tanacross Drummers & Dancers have been active for many years. They enjoy sharing their songs and dances as a large group to build self-esteem and show pride in their heritage. They believe it is important for future generations to learn and pass on their traditional songs and dances. The Tanacross Dancers and the Hän people have an historic connection, and the dance group enjoys coming to Moosehide Gatherings and celebrations to show their support.

Diyet & The Love Soldiers BURWASH LANDING, YT

Diyet was born in a tent and spent her childhood on the ancestral lands of the Kluane First Nation people in Canada's Yukon Territory. Coming from a family rooted in traditions but tempered with a good sense of adventurous hippie attitudes, Divet has created a musical presence that is as diverse as her Southern Tutchone. Tlingit, Japanese and Scottish heritage. She discovered her voice singing on the school bus, went on to acquire a degree in music, then became a published songwriter in Vancouver, BC. When the pull of the North was too strong, she packed her bags, and her Dutch husband, moving back to her village of 90 people without a plan or even a pub to play in. The result of this unlikely career move has been international collaborations, extensive touring, features in the New York Times, MacLean's Magazine, and on BBC Radio (Messiah/Complex). Backed by the Love

Soldiers, she has three acclaimed albums The Breaking Point, When You Were King, and Diyet & The Love Soldiers which received nominations for: "Folk Album Of The Year" at The Indigenous Music Awards, "Indigenous Artist Of The Year" at the Western Canadian Music Awards and won "Indigenous Songwriter Of The Year" at the Canadian Folk Music Awards. Diyet is alternative country, folk, roots and traditional with catchy melodies and stories deeply rooted in Divet's Indigenous world view and northern life. Divet sings in both English and Southern Tutchone (her native language) and plays bass guitar. Backed by Love Soldiers, husband and collaborator, Robert van Lieshout (acoustic guitar, drums & percussion) and Juno Award winning producer, Bob Hamilton (electric guitar, pedal steel & mandolin); this multi-instrumental trio from the Yukon has a sound that can fill a big stage or capture an intimate room.



Jimmy and the Hammers DAWSON CITY, YT

Uncle Jimmy and the Hammerstones was founded June 21, 2019 - National Indigenous People's Day. The band is led by James Roberts (quitar/fiddle). Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in citizen and Dawson resident Peter Menzies (fiddle/vocals). The Hammerstones focus on jigging and square dance music and are called upon to support community dances and Dawsons' youth fiddle club. Depending on the event, the band can be a four piece or a backup band with 20 fiddlers!



Tagish Nation Dancers WHITEHORSE, YT

Tagish Nation Dancers have been practicing and performing since 1973. With direction and help from Angela Sidney and Clara Schinkel. Thier songs and dances reflect the Tlingit and Tagish heritage. They are very grateful to continue the practice after so much and so long.



Ed Peekeekoot VANCOUVER ISLAND, BC

Ed Peekeekoot is a gifted and very experienced musician, storyteller, and artist from the Ahtahkakoop Cree First Nation in Saskatchewan, now living on Vancouver Island. Multi-instrumentalist, singer-songwriter, and storyteller, Ed Peekeekoot is a skilled and seasoned performer. He has a timeless kind of cool that appeals to audiences of all ages. Ed's performances go from blazing guitar work to foot stomping fiddle and haunting Native flute - all sprinkled with his Cree humor and philosophy. Ed has released 5 CDs and many of the illustrations for a Cree history book that led him to explore the history of his people more deeply. He has appeared on APTN many times and has been featured in a documentary series. Ed's paintings and carvings are in collections around the world.

Teechik Dancers

OLD CROW, YT

The Teechik Dancers have been dancing together for the past 9 years. Adults work with youth and together they showcase the jigging and dancing from North Yukon Old Crow.



Kevin Barr

TAGISH, YT

Kevin Barr first picked up a guitar at the age of 9 and has been playing professionally for the past 50 years. His repertoire is vast and varied, from three tours in Europe with the Undertakin' Daddies to opening for the Ozark Mountain Daredevils, BJ Thomas and

lan Tyson; he has also shared the stage with Peter Roewen of New Riders of the Purple Sage, KD Lang, Willie P. Bennett, Penny Lang and Phil Lloyd.

Kevin is a well-known face at festivals across Canada and the US along with sharing album credits on many prestigious recordings.

Benjamin Boyd VANCOUVER, BC

He can fiddle. He can jig. He can cook. He can sing. But what makes Boyd Wesley Benjamin truly extraordinary is he can fly. Boyd comes from a long line of Gwich'in fiddlers in the North and is widely known for his musical talent, but when he was growing up, he had loftier dreams.

When Boyd was a young boy, he would watch planes taking off and landing from his bedroom window in Old Crow, Yukon. Today he flies for Air Canada but during the Gathering we have the 'flying Gwich'in fiddler' here on the ground at Moosehide, playing for you.



Scott Ward

VICTORIA, BC

Scott Ward is an Ojibway Comedy Hypnotist who originally from Manitoba, Canada but now calls Victoria, BC his home. Scott has sent the last twenty years empowering communities far and wide. The last decade has been spent hosting and performing his comedy hypnosis shows and interactive workshops. You will be amazed and mesmerized by his high quality, fully produced hilarious hypnotic stage show.



Dennis Allen

EDMONTON, AB

Dennis Allen is an exciting and engaging multi-disciplinary artist originally from the frontier town of Inuvik, Northwest Territories. A gifted storyteller, Dennis' work translates seamlessly between film, music, writing, and storytelling. From a long line of ancient Inuvialuit and Gwich'in storytellers. Dennis is a bona fide raconteur. With a slew of awards, and a hat full of accolades. Dennis Allen was born to entertain. Any self-respecting northerner can sing at least one classic tear-jerker. It was a mandatory right of passage and Dennis is no exception. From original music, ranging from hell raising gospel, to blistering blues, Dennis sings and plays with the emotion and purity of classic performers from a different era.



Indigadancer OTTAWA, ON

Feryn Karahkwiiohhstha King, a North American Indigenous (Mohawk) artist and Wolf Clan member from Akwesasne, Quebec, is a multifaceted professional. Her Kani'ekeha name. meaning "She Makes the Moon Beautiful" or "Bright Moon," reflects her identity. Feryn is an international hoop dancer, cultural instructor, acrobatic Aerial Lyra performer, and visual artist. Her passion for dance has taken her across Canada, the United States, and Europe. From self-taught traditional Pow wow dances to a diverse dance education, including Modern, Contemporary, and Ballet, she graduated from Centennial College's Dance Performance Program in 2017. Feryn's journey includes performances at events like Classiqu'Arts SDG and collaborations with Kahawi Dance Theatre and Taboo from the Black Eyed Peas. Recruited by Cirque Du Soleil's TOTEM group, she toured five major European cities from 2018-2020. Today, Feryn continues to share and teach hoop dancing, blending traditional and fusion styles in her unique expression.

Description of Hoop:
First Nations Hoop Dancing is a traditional Indigenous dance form that incorporates intricate movements with hoops. Dancers manipulate multiple hoops to create various shapes and designs, symbolizing aspects of nature, storytelling, and cultural beliefs. Dakhká Khwáan Dancers whitehorse, yt

An Inland Tlingit Dance Group of Northern Canada. The Dancers, are a National Award winning Inland Tlingit dance group based out of Whitehorse, Yukon Territory. They focus on reclaiming their languages and traditional values through their inherent art form of singing, drumming, dancing, and storytelling. They strive to present their performance with the outmost respect to cultural protocol and with the highest form of artistic integrity. Since forming in the community of Carcross in 2007, they have grown from 6 to 30 members and with the addition of a children's group. the Dakhká Khwaán Jrs. Members of the group come from all Interior Tlingit Nations and other welcomed Nations from the Southern Yukon and elsewhere. Dakhká Khwaan means Inland People/Nation, a name given to them by the late Dakla'weidi elder, Mrs. Eliza Bosely. They are members of the Dakla'weidi. Yan Yedi. Ganaxteidi. Deisheetaan, Ishkihittaan, Kookhittaan,



The group is led by Marilyn Jensen, who has danced since she was 2 years old in the group her Late Mother started in the 1970s, The Skookum Jim/Keish Tlingit Dancers. In addition, they are advised and guided by their loving group Elders and through the knowledge passed on from their Ancestors. Members of the group are the decendents of renowned Yukon Indigenous elders: Peter and Agnes Johns, Angela Sidney, Dora Wedge, Johnny Johns, Patsy Henderson, Louise Dickson, Tommy Smarch, Antonia Jack and numerous others. They share a passion for expressing our identity through the arts and absolutely love to sing, drum, learn language, make regalia and dance. Together, they have danced across Canada, the US, New Zealand, Taiwan, the Vancouver 2010 Olympics and the Pam Am in 2015. The group received the 2014 National Aboriginal Cultural-Tourism Award and have been nominated for a Indigenous Music Award for their first album called Reconstruct/Deconstruct which they produced in collaboration with DJ Dash.

Last Chance Fiddle Band VENETIE, ALASKA

Gwich'in fiddle group from Venetie Alaska, Gary Simple, Jerry Frank and Ricky Frank have been playing together since childhood. Growing up in the 60's, they grew all up dancing to old fiddle tunes and between fiddle and guitar players. The Last Chance Fiddle Band is the last traditional fiddle band that plays all the 12 fiddle dances that been handed down since 1800.

This year we are celebrating our Elder Angie Joseph-Rear.


Angie is of the crow clan, mother, grandmother and a descendant of the Hän Hwëch'in. She was born at St Mary's Hospital and was raised in Moosehide village with 8 of her siblings. Angie loves being out on the land with her friends and family practicing the cultural ways of her ancestors. Her summers were spent with her husband Robert Rear and children at Moosehide Village fishing for Chinook and Chum salmon. And in the fall season they would hunt for Caribou and Moose.

Angie is well known for her beautiful beadwork projects, and she often donates her work to community charities.

Angie served as the Chief of Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in between 1987 and 1990. After her term as a leader she provided a strong voice on the TH council and expresses how important the language is for her people.

Angie has spent many years as a Hän language teacher, dedicated to the preservation of the language. She spends much of her free time teaching at youth events and culture camps ensuring that important lessons include language activities and the sharing of traditional knowledge, stories, and traditional law, or Da'ole. When at the culture camps, she enjoys teaching the youth about preserving the harvest and how to smoke and dry meat and fish.




